



WASHINGTON – U.S. Sen. Tom Udall reported that today President Barack Obama signed the Katie Sepich Enhanced DNA Collection Act of 2012 into law.

Katie's Law will expand DNA collection efforts from serious criminal offenders in order to save lives, solve crimes and prevent future tragedies from occurring at the hands of repeat offenders.

The bill was named for a New Mexico State University graduate student who was brutally raped and murdered in 2003.

The Legislative and Litigation History of Special Education

Abstract

Between the mid 1960s and 1975, state legislatures, the federal courts, and the U.S. Congress spelled out strong educational rights for children with disabilities. Forty-five state legislatures passed laws mandating, encouraging, and/or funding special education programs. Federal courts, interpreting the equal protection and due process guarantees of the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, ruled that schools could not discriminate on the basis of disability and that parents had due process rights related to their children's schooling.

Congress, in legislation now retitled the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), laid out detailed procedural protections regarding eligibility for special educational services, parental rights, individualized education programs (IEPs), the requirement that children be served in the least restrictive environment, and the need to provide related (noneducational) services. Decisions on instructional matters such as curricula and the elements of the IEP remain the province of local and state authorities.



1946 - <u>Mendez vs. Westminster and the California Board of Education.</u>
The U.S. District Court in Los Angeles, California ruled that it is unconstitutional to educate children of Mexican descent in separate facilities. This prohibited segregation in California schools. This set a precedent for the case of Brown vs. Board of Education of Topeka.

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
I. INTRODUCTION





The Path To Education In New Mexico Is Particularly Difficult

Charles Minard's Map Of Napoleon's March To Moscow (Drawn In 1869)









Percentage of 25- to 64-Year-Olds With Associate Degrees And Higher By Group



Percentage of 25- to 64-Year-Olds By Educational Attainment And By Hearing Status




We Lose Too Many Students Along The Way

The Issue Is Opportunity

"What is important is a goal toward which we are moving, a goal that is the basis of true democracy, which is over and above the law. And it's something that won't happen. But you must pray for it and work for it, and that goal is very simple.

That goal is that if a child, a Negro child, is born to a black mother in a state like Mississippi or any other state like that, born to the dumbest, poorest sharecropper, if by merely drawing its first breath in the democracy, there and without any more, he is born with the exact same rights as a similar child born to a white parent of the wealthiest person in the United States.

No, it's not true. It never will be true. But I challenge anybody to take the position that that is not the goal that we should be shooting for. And stop talking about how far we've come, and stop talking about how close we are."

The Yazzie/Martinez v. New Mexico Decision 2018

- The Court declared that the State had violated the New Mexico Constitution by failing to provide at-risk children with a uniform statewide system of free public schools sufficient for their education.
- For purposes of this case, at-risk students include children who come from economically disadvantaged homes, children who are English Language Learners, children who are Native American, and children with a disability.
- The State of New Mexico and the PED have failed to provide at-risk students with sufficient funding and effective programs and services necessary to make them college or career ready.

Why The Yazzie/Martinez Case Is Important For Higher Education

- The Court found that the quality of teaching for at-risk students was inadequate.
- The Court found the high number of public-school students who needed college remediation was a key indicator of an inadequate public education system.
- The Court provided a thoughtful and sophisticated reaffirmation of why education is critical to our democracy.

The Court Wrestled With How To Define A Sufficient Education

"A uniform system of free public schools sufficient for the education of, and open to, all the children of school age in the state shall be established and maintained."

New Mexico Constitution Art. XII, § 1. Public schools

After reviewing how similar cases in other states had defined a sufficient or adequate education, Judge Singleton wrote, "Taken together, these cases seem to stand for the proposition that an adequate education is one that prepares school children to be functioning members of the civic, cultural and economic aspects of our society." Judge Pro Tem Singleton, 2018

How Kentucky Defined A Sufficient Education

- (i) sufficient oral and written communication skills to enable students to function in a complex and rapidly changing civilization;
- (ii) sufficient knowledge of economic, social, and political systems to enable the student to make informed choices;
- (iii) sufficient understanding of governmental processes to enable the student to understand the issues that affect his or her community, state, and nation;
- (iv) sufficient self-knowledge and knowledge of his or her mental and physical wellness;
- (v) sufficient grounding in the arts to enable each student to appreciate his or her cultural and historical heritage;
- (vi) sufficient training or preparation for advanced training in either academic or vocational fields so as to enable each child to choose and pursue life work intelligently; and
- (vii) sufficient levels of academic or vocational skills to enable public school students to compete favorably with their counterparts in surrounding states, in academics or in the job market.








New Mexico Higher Education Faces The Challenges Of Declining Enrollments And Decreased Funding



% saying colleges and universities have a positive/negative effect on the way things are going in the country







% saying the higher education system in the U.S. today is generally going in the ...








